The Birth of EdYOUFest

Sometimes the most powerful movements don't begin with a plan. They begin with a need."

Palermo, summer evening 2015

Palermo doesn't whisper. It sings.



Piazza Politeama – Palermo, Sicily

That summer evening, Piazza Politeama was alive with soundhorns echoing off stone façades, laughter spilling from cafés, scooters threading their way through the crowd. Chuck and I had just parked the car and

were crossing the square when the Teatro Politeama rose in front of us, solid and theatrical, as if reminding us that art, culture, and community had always belonged in shared spaces.

We were heading to **La Posada**, a trattoria I knew well. Years earlier, during my time in Sicily, it had become a familiar stop—honest food, no pretence, deeply local. I wanted Chuck to taste not just fresh fish, but the soul of the city.

That night, though, we carried more than appetite. We carried momentum.







The Road That Led Us There

Our journey to Palermo had nothing to do with leisure. In the days leading up to that dinner, we had crossed Sicily from west to east: **Salemi, Caltanissetta, Catania**. Three conferences. Three provinces. Three school theatres filled with teachers.

Each event followed the same simple format: a two-hour plenary

led by Chuck, followed by a Q&A session

that never respected the clock. Teachers stayed. They leaned forward. They challenged ideas. They asked questions rooted in real classrooms, real students, real constraints.

What struck me most was not only Chuck's ability to energise a room, but the atmosphere itself. These were not glossy hotel ballrooms or distant academic halls. These were ordinary public schools—the places where teachers lived their professional lives every day.

By the end of that short tour, we had met nearly **700 teachers**.

And nothing about their response felt ordinary.

A Conversation That Changed Everything

As we walked through Palermo that evening, Chuck said something that stayed with me.

"It feels different here. These schools are alive. This is where teachers belong." He was right.

Elsewhere, conferences often felt transactional: a ticket purchased, a seat taken, a

speaker elevated on a stage, and then everyone returning to separate professional silos. But in Sicily, inside those school theatres, there was no

invisible wall distance—no between speaker and participant, expert and practitioner.

At La Posada, over plates of pasta and grilled swordfish, the conversation shifted.

What if this wasn't just a series of conferences?

What if it could be something else entirely?

Not an event for teachers, but something that belonged to them.

A festival.

A space where plenary speakers could inspire—but where teachers themselves could step onto a stage, perhaps for the first time, and share their practice. A space where professional growth and human connection were inseparable. Where a session could flow naturally into a shared meal, a cultural walk, a moment of laughter.

That night, we didn't know we were designing EdYOUFest. But we were already imagining its heart.



When the Name Found Us

Even the name had not yet arrived—but it was close.

As we spoke, certain words kept resurfacing: education, community, teachers. And one word, repeated almost unconsciously: you.

Because teachers were not an audience to be spoken at.

They were the centre. The reason. The voice.



EdYOUFest Tokyo 2025

At some point, the idea aligned itself with surprising clarity:

Educational Festival. With YOU—teachers—always in the middle.

Education YOU Festival

EdYOUFest.



It wasn't a branding decision. It was a belief made visible. Remove you, and the entire idea falls apart. The name itself carried a promise: this would never be a top-down event. It would be built *with* teachers, not merely *for* them.

From that moment on, every decision would be guided by a simple question:

Does this keep teachers at the centre?



Why a Festival, not a Conference



Festivals celebrate. They invite participation. They belong to people.

In English Language Teaching, what was missing was not knowledge, but **connection**. Teachers often worked in isolation, behind closed classroom doors. Professional development existed, but it was frequently hierarchical, expensive,

or inaccessible. Many teachers felt like consumers of expertise rather than contributors to it.

We wanted to break that pattern.

What if teachers could come together as equals—not only to receive, but to give? To present, to collaborate, to feel recognised?





A Necessary Moment

Looking back, the timing was no accident.

Teaching was already under pressure. Burnout, low pay, lack of recognition, and rapid global changes—from economic instability to the early waves of digital transformation—were reshaping classrooms everywhere.

And yet, what we saw in Sicily was hope.

Teachers were eager for a space where their voices mattered. EdYOUFest, still unnamed in spirit, was a response to that need. It was never only about professional training. It was about dignity, belonging, and community.



Seeds of What Would Become EdYOUFest

That dinner planted the ideas that would later define the festival's DNA:

- Schools, not hotels keeping events rooted in real educational spaces.
- Stages for everyone giving every teacher the chance to speak, not only the "big names."
- Excellence with inclusion global thought leaders alongside everyday practitioners.
- Community as curriculum meals, walks, and shared experiences woven into the programme, not added as extras.



From Idea to a Global Movement:

The EdYOUFest Journey

What began as a conversation in Palermo soon became a journey across borders, cultures, and classrooms. Year after year, EdYOUFest grew—not by expanding its size alone, but by deepening its sense of purpose and community.

2015 - Genoa, Italy: The Beginning



The very first EdYOUFest gathering took place in September 2015 in Genoa, Italy. It brought together a group of internationally recognised trainers with a shared goal: to explore new ways of learning, sharing, and connecting within the ELT community.

Over three days of presentations, group work, discussions, and social moments, a unique atmosphere emerged—one that felt both innovative and deeply human. By the end of the event, EdYOUFest had taken

its first tangible form.

2016 - Palermo, Sicily: The First Public Event

In 2016, EdYOUFest held its first public edition at **La Baia del Corallo** in Palermo, Sicily. Teachers took part in a rich programme of workshops, alongside evening events filled with music, laughter, and shared experiences.

The success of this edition set the tone for what EdYOUFest would







become: joyful learning, genuine connection, and a growing sense of belonging. It also marked EdYOUFest's first real presence on social media, extending the community beyond the event itself.

2017 - Paris, France: Growing Beyond Borders



The following year, EdYOUFest the moved to French countryside near Paris. With participants arriving from an increasing number of countries, the festival confirmed its international vocation and strengthened its identity as a truly global experience.

2018 - Millfield, United Kingdom: A New Level

In 2018, EdYOUFest reached an important milestone. Hosted at Millfield

Later that same year, EdYOUFest launched a new website and established a formal committee of six members, supported by twelve Fellows and a growing network of volunteers. The organisational foundations of the project were now firmly in place.





2019 - Millfield Returns and the First Event Fund

In 2019, EdYOUFest returned to Millfield and introduced its first event fund,

created to support teachers who might otherwise have been unable to attend.

This initiative reflected one of EdYOUFest core values: inclusion. It reinforced the belief that professional development should be accessible, and that opportunity should never be limited by circumstance.



2020-2021 - The Online Transition



In 2020 and 2021, the festival transitioned online, delivering a two-week digital programme that kept teachers connected during an unprecedented period of uncertainty. Despite the physical distance, the sense of community remained strong—perhaps stronger than ever.

2022 - Trapani, Sicily: Back Together Again



In 2022, EdYOUFest returned to in-person events in Trapani, Sicily, introducing a hybrid format that blended face-to-face and online participation.





This edition marked a joyful reunion. Teachers from across the world came together once again to learn, reconnect, and celebrate education in shared spaces.

2023 - Athens, Greece: A Global Celebration

The 2023 edition took place in Athens, Greece, welcoming more than two hundred teachers alongside multiple sponsors and partners.

It was a vibrant celebration of diversity, creativity, and professional growth—an event that reaffirmed EdYOUFest's reputation as a thriving and inclusive international community.



2024 - Bucharest, Romania: A New Chapter



In 2024, EdYOUFest arrived in Bucharest, opening a new chapter in its ongoing journey.

Building on the successes of previous years, the event showcased an increasingly global network of educators and marked another step in EdYOUFest evolution—from a single annual festival to a series of interconnected experiences.





2025 - Tokyo and Malta: A Historic Year



EdYOUFest Tokyo 2025

The year 2025 marked a historic milestone: for the first time, EdYOUFest hosted two international conferences in the same year. The journey began in Tokyo, Japan, where EdYOUFest made its Asian debut with an inspiring and truly global gathering of educators. Later that year, the community came together again in Malta, further extending its presence across the Mediterranean.

Together, these two events made 2025 one of the most memorable and impactful years in the EdYOUFest story.
