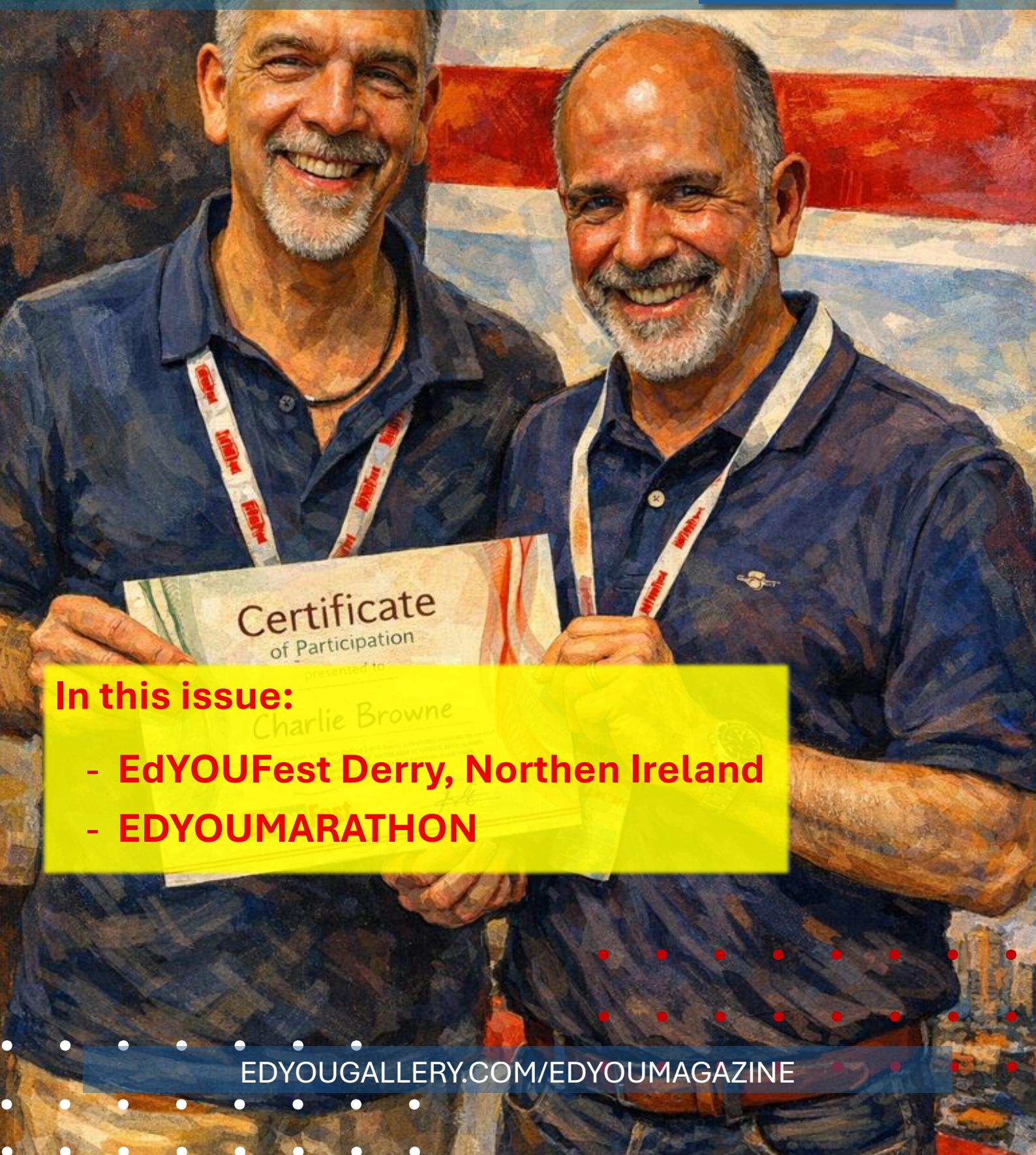

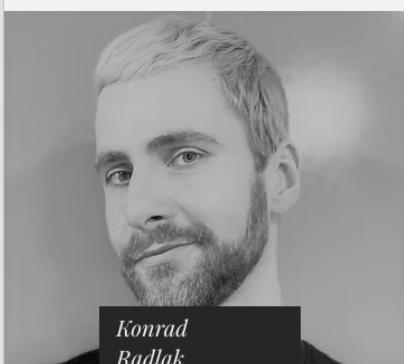

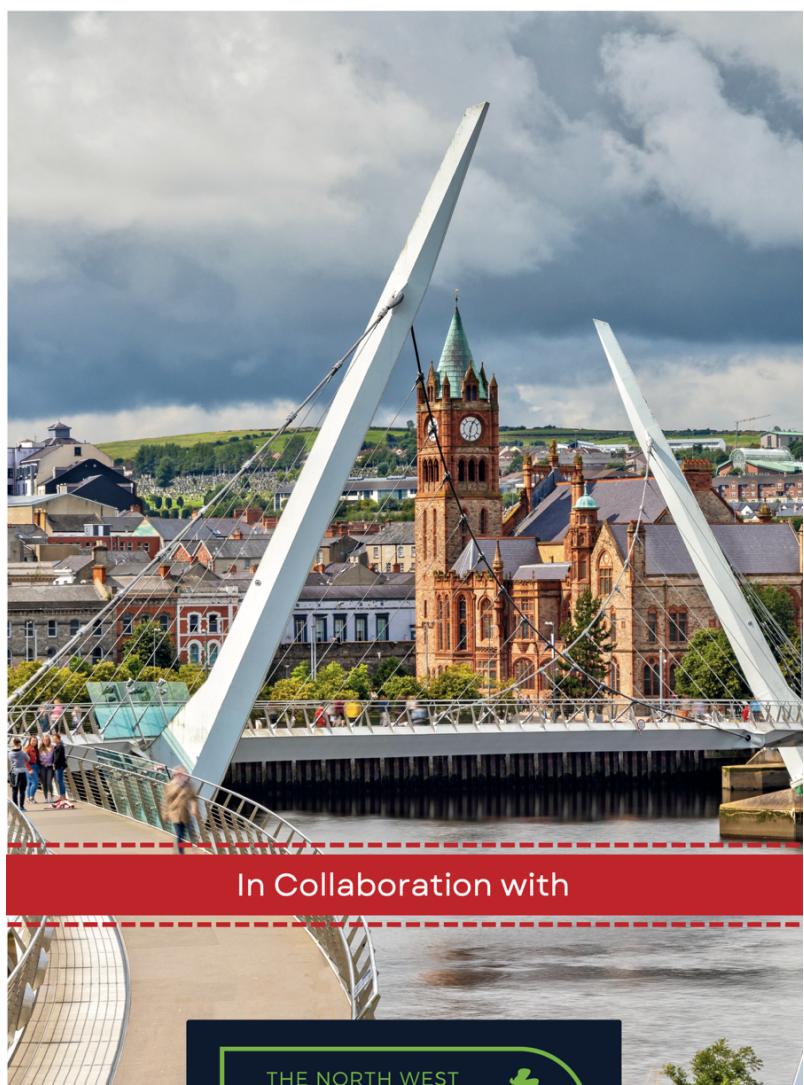

The programme includes **4 plenary sessions, 12 workshop sessions, 1 panel session, and 1 poster session**, offering participants a rich mix of theory, innovation, and hands-on professional development. Each session is designed to encourage reflection, interaction and meaningful discussion, making EdYOUFest a truly engaging learning experience.

Theme

The theme of the 2026 edition offers a highly topical reflection: **Human Intelligence in the Age of Technology: Key to Future Teaching?** At a time when AI is increasingly entering the classroom, EdYOUFest invites educators to rediscover the value of genuinely human skills: empathy, creativity, critical thinking, communication, and the ability to inspire.





TITLE:

THE VOCABULARY REVOLUTION: HOW CORPUS TOOLS, EXTENSIVE READING, AND AI CAN TRANSFORM LEARNING

SPEAKER: CHARLIE BROWNE

PRESENTATION TYPE: PLENARY

Abstract

Vocabulary knowledge is the single strongest predictor of reading success, yet many learners spend years studying words they seldom encounter. This plenary argues for a more efficient, evidence-based approach—one that brings together corpus research, extensive reading, and emerging AI technologies into a coherent system for accelerated language growth.

We will examine how high-frequency word lists such as the NGSL can provide a powerful backbone for instruction; how extensive reading offers the volume of meaningful input essential for mastery; and how new AI-enhanced tools can support teachers by generating level-appropriate materials, profiling texts, and personalizing learning pathways in real time.

Rather than overwhelming learners with complexity, this integrated approach creates clarity, efficiency, and momentum—giving teachers more time to teach, and students more opportunities to enjoy using English. Participants will leave with practical techniques and free tools they can immediately apply in their classrooms.

Biography

Dr. Charles Browne is Professor of TESOL & Applied Linguistics at Meiji Gakuin University in Tokyo, where he directs the English Department's MA and PhD programs and founded its EFL teacher-training track. He is internationally recognized for his contributions to second language vocabulary research and as co-creator and Director of the New General Service List (NGSL) Project. His corpus-based word lists and more than 15 freely available online tools are used by teachers, researchers, ministries, and publishers around the world.

Across four decades in Japan, Dr. Browne has shaped research-informed approaches to vocabulary development, extensive reading, and technology-enhanced language learning. In recent years he has become a leading figure in integrating AI into principled pedagogy, developing NGSL-aligned text-creation tools, lexical profilers, and digital resources that support teachers while expanding learner autonomy.

A sought-after speaker, he has delivered more than 75 plenary and keynote addresses internationally and has presented two TEDx Talks on vocabulary acquisition. As CEO of CBC Consulting, he advises publishers, boards of education, EdTech companies, and global organizations on designing effective, scalable language-learning systems—and remains open to new collaborations that advance innovative, research-driven English education.



TITLE:

MEDIATION IN EFL TEACHING: ENHANCING THE HUMAN ADVANTAGE IN LEARNING

Abstract

In a rapidly evolving educational landscape where AI and digital tools are transforming learning, the future of teaching depends on distinctly human capacities: connection, meaning-making, and shared understanding. This presentation explores CEFR Mediation as a powerful expression of human intelligence in language education. Mediation goes beyond linguistic accuracy; it requires emotional sensitivity and nurtures empathy, collaboration, critical thinking and intercultural awareness — skills uniquely human and essential for deeper understanding. These competencies empower learners to co-construct knowledge and communicate purposefully across diverse contexts. The session highlights practical strategies and classroom applications that integrate Mediation in the EFL classroom, demonstrating how teachers can enhance the human dimension of learning and prepare students not only to use English but also to connect meaningfully in a technology-rich world.

Biography

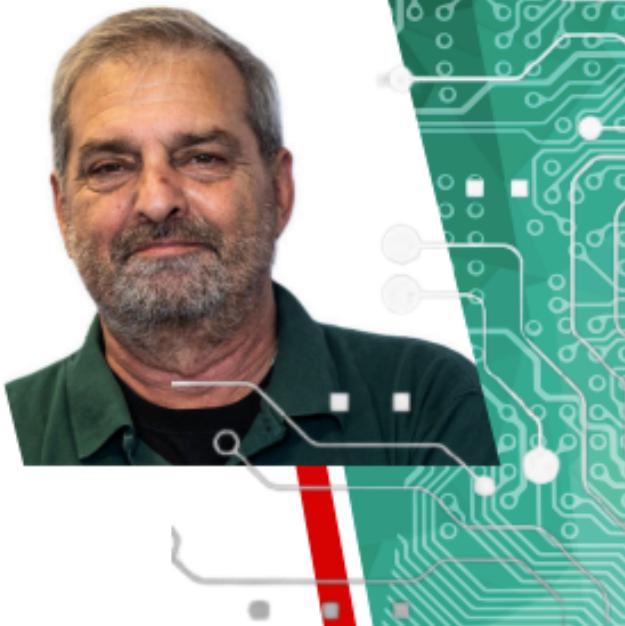

Abstract

In an age where AI tools are transforming classrooms, one element remains irreplaceable: teacher passion.

This talk explores why passion is central to English language teaching and how it fuels motivation, creativity, and resilience in learners. While AI can assist with practice, feedback, and efficiency, it cannot replicate the human spark that inspires students to take risks, persevere, and find joy in language learning. Drawing on classroom stories, practical examples, and reflections, the session will highlight how teachers can harness technology while protecting and amplifying the passion that makes their work transformative.

Biography

Rob Howard is the owner of the Online Language Center and Business Language Training Institute. He is a teacher, writer and frequent worldwide speaker and trainer on Business English, Teacher Development, Entrepreneurship, teaching online, and using technology and images. He is the current IATEFL Poland president, former Joint Coordinator of the IATEFL BESIG, Gallery Teachers Masterclass presenter, iTDi TOEFL course trainer, member of the C Group, as well as co-founder of the Independent Authors & Publishers. Rob is also the creator of EFLtalks, teachers teaching teachers, nominated for the 2016 British Council's ELTon Award for Innovation in Teacher Resources.

"Relevance in revolution"

He is College Principal for an international summer programme in Cambridge each summer. He presents regularly at conferences around the world on a range of topics and is a guest lecturer at four universities. He is also a freelance trainer in business and management. Ten years ago he cycled from the UK to Turkey, travelling through 11 countries. He is Ambassador of Buzz for Express publishing.

Local Games, Global Skills: Moroccan Culturally-Based Gamification for Developing 21st-Century Competencies in EFL Education

SPEAKER: Qasserras Lhoussine

PRESENTATION TYPE: WORKSHOP



Abstract

Developing 21st-century skills—collaboration, communication, critical thinking, and creativity—has become a key priority in English language education. While gamification is widely promoted as an engaging pedagogical approach, many models depend heavily on digital tools and overlook the value of local cultural resources.

This session presents a culturally responsive approach to gamification derived from the Moroccan context, demonstrating how traditional and community-based games can be adapted to enhance both language learning and transversal skills in EFL classrooms. Drawing on classroom practice and teacher-training experiences, the presentation connects theoretical foundations of gamification with practical, low-tech strategies accessible to diverse educational settings.

Participants will explore Moroccan-inspired activities such as storytelling circles, movement challenges, and collaborative competitions that promote teamwork, problem-solving, and learner autonomy. By moving from theory to actionable classroom techniques, this session highlights how local culture can generate globally relevant skills and create more meaningful, inclusive learning experiences.

Can teachers realistically create a “digital clone” to handle routine work—or is it just a tech myth?

Abstract:

Can teachers realistically create a “digital clone” to handle routine work—or is it just a tech myth?

This session explores how no-code automation may allow ELT professionals to delegate repetitive administrative and classroom tasks to simple workflows. By automating processes like feedback delivery, scheduling, and documentation, teachers and managers can reclaim time and mental energy for teaching and decision-making. The focus is not replacement, but professional amplification: using automation to support, not overshadow, the human role of the educator.

Bio:

Anna Lipina, PhD, is an academic and research director, linguist, and teacher trainer with over 15 years of experience in English language education. DELTA certified, she has led international research on digital transformation in education and directed a university language department serving over 1,000 students annually with a team of 39 associates. Her expertise spans linguistics, ESP, and digital learning.

Abstract

Her work emphasizes human-centered reshapes language education, the essential question shifts from 'How advanced is the technology?' Her work underemphasises human-centered hands-on workshop demonstrates how Cognitive Load Theory guides effective AI integration, showcasing three categories of practical tools: adaptive learning applications that personalize practice through intelligent algorithms; generative AI for rapid creation of differentiated, level-appropriate materials; and AI-enhanced assessment tools providing timely feedback at scale. Through interactive activities including cognitive load scenario analysis, tool selection exercises, and prompt crafting workshops, participants develop immediately applicable skills for choosing and implementing AI based on pedagogical principles rather than technological novelty. Participants gain hands-on experience with specific tools, templates for creating customized materials, and a decision-framework for sustainable integration—demonstrating that effective AI use in language teaching requires neither technical expertise nor classroom transformation, but rather thoughtful application of student-centered design principles that enhance learning while preserving the irreplaceable human elements of teaching.

Bio

Dr. Inesa Melnyk is an Associate Professor at Carpathian National University in Ukraine, with over 20 years of experience in English language teaching and pedagogical innovation. A TEFL-qualified educator, PhD specializing in adaptive teaching methodologies and AI integration in language classrooms, she has presented at TESOL International Convention and Expo (Tampa, 2024), NYS TESOL Annual Conference (2023), TELIC 2025 and conferences throughout Europe. Her work emphasizes human-centered design principles that enhance teacher capabilities while maintaining the essential human connections that make education transformative.

**Inside the Mental Lexicon: Coaching the Brain
Toward Language Autonomy**

Abstract:

What happens in the brain when learners suddenly “forget” a word and how can we help them retrieve it?

This session steps inside the mental lexicon - the brain’s living network where words, meanings, and experiences connect - to explore how language moves from input to activation. Drawing on applied linguistics, neuroscience, and language coaching, we’ll uncover how to awaken neural pathways to recall.

Participants will experience practical language coaching strategies to help learners self-retrieve words, regulate recall, and build language autonomy.

Bio:

Ms specialize in brain-based learning and personalized accredited NeuroLanguage Coach* (ELC & ICF) and the founder of the Language Coaching Center. For the past 15+ years, I've been helping professionals and organizations transform the way they approach English - not as a subject to study, but as a tool for leadership, growth, and meaningful connection.

My background includes leading the English Project for the Military as a project manager, training teachers on the Teachers' Upgrade platform, and working as an interpreter at international events such as maritime navigation, UN negotiations, the Columbia Business Summit in Dubai, marketing & tourism negotiations in Romania and Ukraine. At the Language Coaching Center, my team and I support entrepreneurs, managers, and freelancers in building confidence with English-speaking clients. Abstract

A workshop to discover how simple mindfulness techniques and emotions can enhance student participation, creativity and performance and help build a safe and nurturing classroom atmosphere.

**AI for teachers who don't have time:

**Abstract**

Teachers everywhere share the same challenge: too much to do and too little time to do it. Lesson planning, materials design, assessment, documentation, reporting, and communication often compete with the thing that matters most – actual teaching. In this workshop participants will explore practical AI tools that can simplify the daily workload and assist in creating lesson plans, generating tasks, adapting texts, producing worksheets, and managing routine tasks. The focus is simple: how to have smarter lessons, less stress, and more time to be the teacher you want to be – not the one buried under paperwork.

Bio

Olena Kuzmenko is a PhD and Associate Professor at Zhytomyr Ivan Franko State University, where she teaches English, cultural studies, communication, and methodology. Passionate about supporting modern teachers, she brings together academic expertise and practical classroom innovation. Her interests lie in language teaching, intercultural communication, English teaching methodology, and educational design. Olena is the author of scholarly articles in philology, methodology, and cultural studies, contributing actively to the academic community and shaping contemporary approaches to language education. Beyond her university work, she has extensive experience organizing field trips, charity initiatives, and educational events that connect learning with real-world engagement.

From 2015 to 2019, she participated in the pilot phase of the “New Generation School Teacher” project earning a trainer certificate that allows her to support both in-service and pre-service teachers.

In 2020, Olena completed a CELTA internship where she gained the internationally recognized CELTA certificate, which qualifies her to teach English to non-native speakers around the world.

Today, she continues to combine methodological expertise, international professional development, and innovative approaches to help teachers thrive in a rapidly changing educational landscape.

TITLE:

Happy Hormones in Action – Energizers to Boost Motivation, Focus, and Classroom Dynamics

SPEAKER: Eng Hai Tan

PRESENTATION TYPE: WORKSHOP



Abstract

This interactive workshop explores how brain-based teaching strategies enhance student motivation and focus. Drawing on Self-Determination Theory (SDT) and neuroscience, participants will discover how the brain's "happy hormones" (dopamine, oxytocin, serotonin, and endorphins) support emotional well-being, memory, and learning. A central feature of the session is the use of no-preparation energizers, simple, adaptable activities that immediately increase attention, participation, and classroom dynamics for learners of any age. We will build simple routines that foreground students' offline skills—task analysis, outlining, note-taking, paraphrasing, source-checking, and style control—and agree a plain-English disclosure policy for AI use. Attendees leave with reusable templates and low-prep activities they can run tomorrow.

Motivation is widely recognised as a key determinant of success in SLA, yet sustaining learner engagement in the EFL classroom remains a persistent challenge for teachers working with diverse linguistic, cultural, and educational backgrounds. This workshop explores the nature of learner motivation and examines practical strategies for fostering sustained engagement across a range of EFL contexts.

Drawing on established theories of motivation in language learning, including intrinsic and extrinsic motivation and self-determination theory, the session encourages participants to reflect on their own teaching practices and learner profiles. The workshop integrates research-informed principles with hands-on activities, demonstrating how task design, goal setting, feedback, autonomy, and relevance can be leveraged to enhance motivation at all proficiency levels.

Abstract

Post-method language teaching, as proposed by Kumaravadivelu (2003), is a response to the limitations of fixed teaching methods (like grammar translation or the communicative approach). Instead of prescribing a best method, it empowers teachers to adapt, design and theorise based on their own classroom realities.

Its three key parameters are:

1. Particularity → Teaching must be sensitive to local context: learners' needs, institutional constraints, cultural realities.
2. Practicality → Teachers are not just consumers of theory; they generate usable knowledge from their own practice.
3. Possibility → Teaching is transformative: it should empower learners, address inequalities, and open space for critical thinking.

The implications for teachers are that flexibility is favoured over formula, their role is as a reflective practitioner and decision-maker and that classroom practice is shaped by context.

Students benefit from content tailored to context, culture and needs, a more inclusive classroom environment and increased empowerment and agency.

This workshop will give teachers a platform to share their own experiences with fixed methods, discuss how they use them in their own teaching practice and any limitations they have found. Together we will explore the key parameters and relate them to our own teaching contexts before putting them into action in a micro-design lesson snippet planning activity.

The takeaway from this session is that teachers will be able to utilise the parameters of post-method language teaching, combined with their own experience and knowledge of their learners to help to create relevant, flexible, empowering and practical lessons which value student context and identity.

A REVIEW OF JAPANESE EDUCATION REFORMS IN A PARADIGM SHIFT

Abstract

The current educational paradigm shift facing the world has increased the push from countries the world over to urgently map out their strategies on their adoption of AI and to further enhance their drive for sustainable living. In Japan, such concerns have led to the implementation of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) programs. To reach its own societal and educational goals, The Ministry of Education, Culture, Science, Sports, and Technology - Japan (MEXT) has mandated school boards to develop soft skills within their students through the employment of collaborative learning. Such a call has been met with resistance from various segments of society.

This presentation looks at the MEXT's further shift away from traditional teaching methods in a historically proud and globally successful Confucian Heritage Culture (CHC). Using data from the presenter's PhD research as well as Japan-based literature, the focus will be on the dichotomy between MEXT policy and the traditions of practitioners in classrooms in Japan. It will introduce a more student-centered and teacher-friendly pedagogy to reach the intended goals. Recommendations will be provided to harmonize the 21st reforms with a culturally sensitive approach.

Biography

Joël Laurier is co-director of the Intensive English Program in the Keio University (Japan) Faculty of Law. A French-Canadian who began learning English He graduated from Columbia University with an M.A. (TESOL) and is currently a PhD candidate at Sophia University (Japan). Abstract

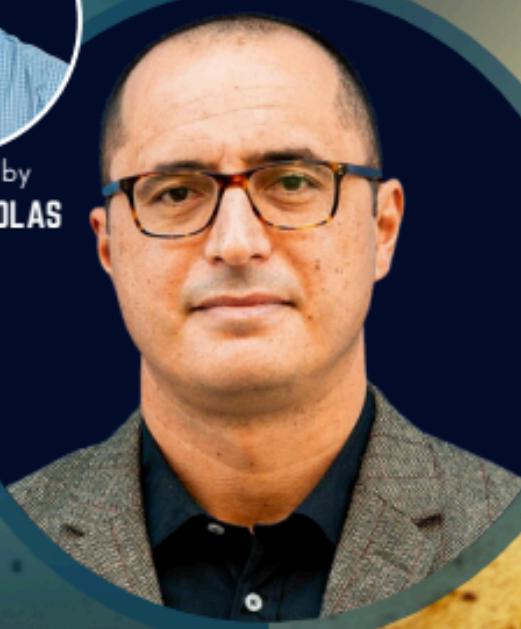

LEADING AND TEACHING ON EMPTY: UNDERSTANDING BURNOUT IN ELT

Abstract

Burnout is an increasingly urgent issue in English Language Teaching, affecting not only teachers but also the school leaders who support and manage them. Drawing on recent research, this plenary explores the shared and contrasting experiences of burnout among teachers, Directors of Studies, and Academic Managers. It examines the causes of emotional and physical exhaustion in demanding educational environments, the impact on wellbeing, performance, and staff retention, and the ripple effects across school communities. The session also highlights evidence-based strategies for preventing and mitigating burnout, including systemic, organisational, and individual approaches. By foregrounding the voices of both educators and leaders, this talk aims to spark reflection on how ELT institutions can cultivate healthier, more sustainable workplaces where everyone – teachers and leaders alike – can thrive.

Daniel Xerri is an Associate Professor in Applied Linguistics and TESOL at the University of Malta, and the Chairperson of the ELT Council. He has published widely on different areas of English language education. He has delivered plenary talks and keynotes in 20 countries and his research has been awarded international prizes. ENGAGING THE STUDENTS OF 2026: GENERATION ALPHA AND BEYOND

Abstract

"Motivation is no longer the primary key for successful learning" (Mercer, 2019). Even the most motivated student can get distracted in these difficult times, and we can hardly blame them. Not only is the world around our learners an ever more challenging place to live, but since life online became the new normal, what chance do we stand as teachers, trying to hold their attention? The answer is Learner Engagement, which has been described as "one of the hottest research topics in the field of educational psychology" (Sinatra, Heddy & Lombardi, 2015). In this session we will look at the three key steps of fostering learner engagement in teens: creating learner willingness to engage, triggering active engagement and then keeping our learners engaged, to ensure that a much higher level of learning is taking place. Come and find out why engagement is now being called "the holy grail of learning" (Ibid.)

Biography

Alastair Grant is an experienced teacher trainer, academic director, ELT author and public speaker. He is the founder of Alastair Grant Teacher Training, which delivers professional education programmes such as the Cambridge Delta, for teachers worldwide. Alastair is lead trainer for the Cambridge Delta 3 teaching diploma at International House Mexico, and lead trainer for International House Montevideo, where he runs the Cambridge Delta 1 and Cambridge Delta 3 teaching diplomas. Teachers are promised a virtual wonderland when looking at materials and yet very often the material does not satisfy the teachers when it is applied in practice. TOO GOOD TO BE BAD; TOO BAD TO BE GOOD



Abstract

This session grew out of a question someone asked me when I complained that it was harder to edit AI-generated text than text from a human being, even if the latter contained more of what we would consider "mistakes" with the language. Why would it be harder to work with more correct language? I'll share that answer with you, and then take you along with my further explorations, which started small ("Can you always tell if a text is AI-generated?") and ended large ("Why do humans use language?"). And yes, there will be direct implications for your classroom—and yourself.

Dorothy Zemach taught ESL and other foreign languages for over 20 years, in Asia, Africa, and the US. She holds an MA in TESL from the School for International Training in Vermont, USA. This 50-minute virtual session presents the E-D-R-C Cycle (Expand, Deepen, Refine, Connect) as an engaging, structured tool, the Probing Question Wall, to guide English Language Students toward sophisticated written responses. We will show how this framework systematically addresses common challenges in L2 writing: ensuring Vocabulary & Structural Clarity (E), justifying language choices and evidence (D), correcting and polishing Grammar/Syntax (R), and integrating the learning with broader language and cultural contexts (C). Participants will experience the power of the EDRC Probing Questions in virtual quick-drills, demonstrating a clear path to transforming basic English responses into advanced, well-formed pieces.

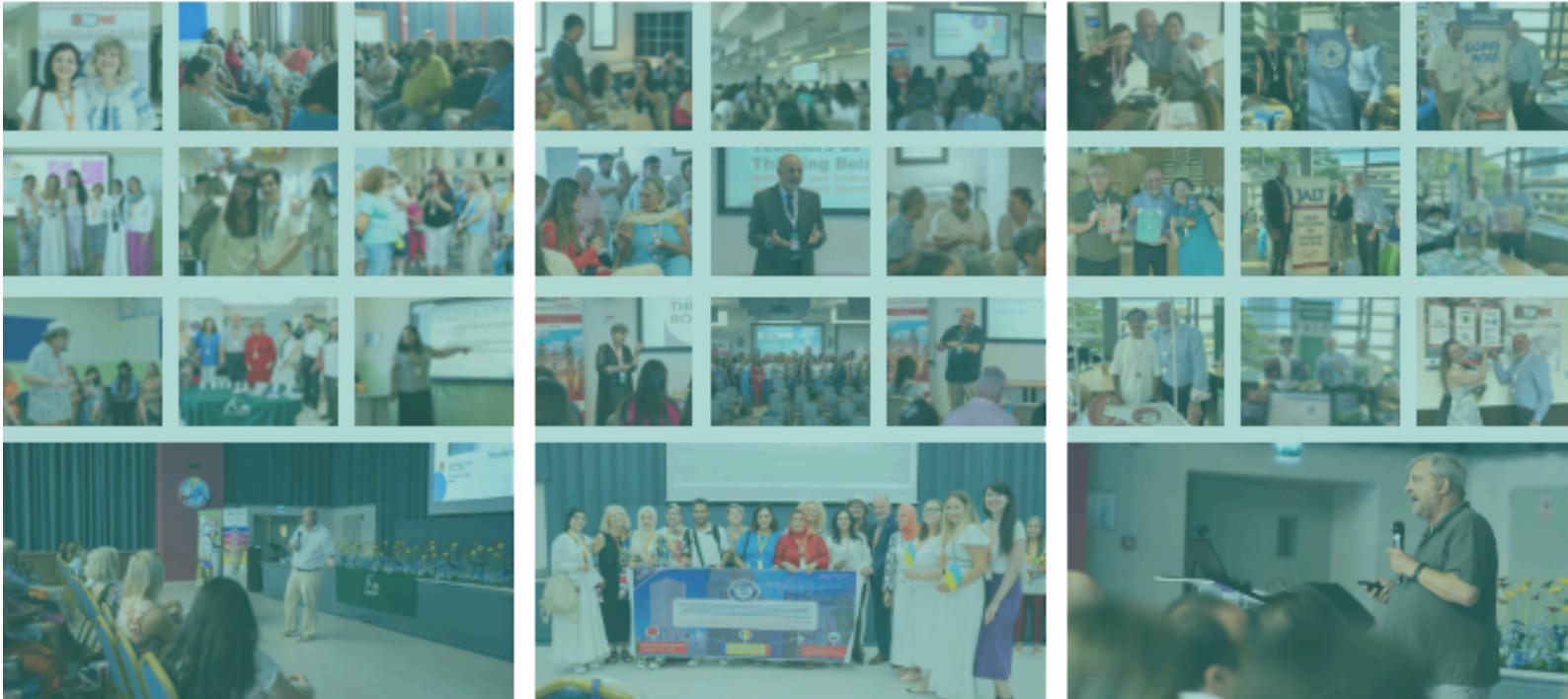
